THE PROJECT

In the past decade, European societies have witnessed the rise of antisemitism.

The HANNAH project focuses on antisemitism countering by promoting Jewish history and Shoah remembrance in Germany, Greece, Serbia, and Poland. The project includes several capacity-building trainings, awareness raising activities and policymaking recommendations on a national and Europe-wide level.

HANNAH strives to enhance know-ledge, revive new forms of remembrance, raise awareness about antisemitism, develop innovative methods to combat hatred and discrimination against Jews, and implement capacity-building and awareness raising activities at local, national and European policymaking level.

HANNAH brings together 6 partners from Germany, Poland, Greece and Serbia: Jugend- & Kulturprojekt e.V. - JKPeV - Coordinator of the project (Dresden, Germany), Galicia Jewish Museum (Krakow, Poland), Jewish Museum of Greece (Athens, Greece), Terraforming (Novi Sad, Serbia), Centropa (Hamburg, Germany) and ReadLab (Athens, Greece)

HANNAH is co-funded by the Rights, Equality, Citizenship Program of the European Union Agreement Ref. Number 963769-REC-RRAC-RACI-AG-2020 for a duration of two years (from 01/12/2020 to 30/11/2022).

What we aim to achieve

The main activities and outputs of HANNAH are the following: (For more information, please follow the links)



30 Oral history interviews from Germany, Greece, Poland and Serbia, which will be presented during our final event in Athens in late 2022

Approximately 30 interviews with second generation Shoah survivors will be produced. These semi-structured interviews will be digital and available for researchers.



A <u>documentary film</u> comprised of 5 different episodes - Krakow (PL), Hamburg (DE), Dresden (DE), Athens (GR) and Novi Sad (CS)

The film will provide an overview of the History and present of the Jewish population in the participating cities as well as focus on contemporary antisemitism.



A digital Repository of Antisemitic Narratives

The Digital Repository will include the main antisemitic narratives and corresponding, debunking responses based on the research of each partner which will be used as part of the educational material.

An Educational Graphic Novel

The Novel will be available online. Topics will be mainly about the Jewish life and culture, the Holocaust, antisemitism and the current life of Jewish communities. It will be available in Greek, German, Polish, Serbian and English.



A tailored training programme & Massive Open Online Course (MOOC) on teaching Jewish history and traditions and methods to combat antisemitism


16 workshops will be implemented – 4 in each partner country. 25 school teachers, librarians, archivists will participate in each workshop. Additionally, a HANNAH Online Training Course will be developed and made available on the Virtual Learning Environment of the project.

Youth Competition

Youth and students will be asked to use the HANNAH educational materials and to create video walking tours, interactive presentations, a video campaign against antisemitism, graphic novels or a short video of an Oral History interview.

Policy Recommendations to combat antisemitism through education

The project partners strive to raise awareness on antisemitism and hate speech towards the Jewish population and thus combat any antisemitic behaviour through education. For this reason, policy recommendations will be drafted and shared with policy makers.



Partner meetings

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the first transnational partners' meeting took place online via zoom; on the 28th and the 29th of January 2021, the partners met online to discuss the scope of the HANNAH project and the deliverables and sub-deliverables of each Work Package as well as the tasks and their specifications. Since the Kick-Off meeting, partners have met monthly online to discuss the progress of their work, the next steps, but also to speak about important topics, such as the relations between the Jewish and Non-Jewish Greek, Serbian German, and Polish after 1945. the population lewish population in Poland, Ger- many, Greece and Serbia, teaching about the Holocaust inschools and modern antisemitism.

The progress of HANNAH project partners' work

Currently all partners are working on the content and the translation of the Training Programme for the face-toface seminars whose Curriculum was designed by the Jewish Museum of Greece.

The Digital Repository of Antisemitic Narratives and the Educational Graphic Novel have also started being developed, whose guidelines and framework were prepared by Terraforming.

The first episode of the HANNAH documentary film about Krakow was shot between the 25th and the 28th of June by the JKPeV team with great support from the Galicia Jewish Museum. The documentary film will be produced by Jugend- & Kulturprojekt e.V. and each episode is dedicated to each city involved in the project - Krakow (PL), Hamburg (DE), Dresden (DE), Athens (GR) and Novi Sad (SRB).

The 30 Oral History Interviews whose guidelines were designed by the Jewish Museum of Greece will be conducted in June and July 2021.
