Our online course on the topic of "Jewish Life and Modern Antisemitism in Germany, Greece, Poland, and Serbia" is **free** to sign up for. It is **self-directed** and **self-paced** and is a valuable resource for both beginners and those with prior knowledge of the topic. It may be particularly useful for teachers and educators wishing to deepen their knowledge and explore different aspects of Jewish history, life, and culture, contemporary antisemitism, and its different forms.

The course includes oral testimonies from Holocaust survivors and makes for a meaningful and interactive learning experience. Assignments conclude each module, allowing for reflection and consolidation of the content learned. The 4th transnational partner meeting was held in Hamburg, Germany on 29-30 September hosted by Centropa and coordinated by JKPeV. Partners discussed the results of their work, the final steps that they should take in the next couple of months, and the impact of all project results. A walking tour in Jewish Hamburg guided by Ian Shulman and a Tour of Jewish Altona and the Sephardic Jewish cemetery guided by Carmen Bisotti enriched our knowledge of the Jewish history, culture and life in the past and present about Hamburg.

Final Partner Meeting in Athens



The final partner meeting was held on the 9th of November 2022 at the lonic Centre in Athens, organised by the Jewish Museum of Greece and coordinated by JKPeV. Special focus was given to the impact of the project, the final report, the exploitation of the project's results, and the publication of all project's activities and events on the HANNAH website. The meeting was closed with a visit to the Museum of Acropolis that impressed the partners.

International Conference in Athens

The international conference was the official closing event of the project held on 10-11 November 2022 at the Ionic Center, organized by the Jewish Museum of Greece in Athens. Representatives of the European Commission, the Ministry of Education of Greece, the German, Polish, and US Embassies in Greece, the International Human Rights Association -IHRA, the World Jewish Congress, and the Jewish Community of Athens, gave salutation speeches. Mrs. Zanet Battinou, the Director of the Jewish Museum of Greece, welcomed all guests, most of schoolteachers whom, were and the educators. Representatives HANNAH partners presented the results of the project, and the event was closed by a guided tour of the historic centre of Athens.
